What is it?

The Food, Agriculture, & Society minor integrates methods and content across the social sciences, humanities, and life sciences to explore the centrality of food and agricultural practices to social life and human experience. This minor includes both classroom experiences and experiential learning opportunities with community partners.





Why do it?

The Food, Agriculture, & Society minor encourages students to investigate how food and food discourses reflect and influence human experiences, extending this critical inquiry to other meaning-making systems such as politics, business, consumption, education, and scientific research. The minor offers a range of mid-level experiences that can match the particular interests and directions of individual students. If you're eager to explore the intricate ways food is embedded in our daily lives and broader systems, this minor offers a comprehensive and engaging approach.

Who is it for?

This minor will serve a range of students across the life sciences, social sciences, and humanities who want sustained training in the study of food, agriculture, and society, as a way to prepare them for future careers in agricultural and food production, policy and advocacy, or writing and cultural production.



Requirements

The 19-hour minor in Food, Agriculture, & Society includes 2 3-hour introductory courses, 6 hours of mid-level pathways courses, 6 hours of free electives and a 1-hour capstone. course.

Elective courses
